## **Police Advisory Committee October 18, 2016**

The meeting was called to order at 4:35 p.m. in the George J. Prescott Room #110 in the Medford Police Department.

Roberta Thornton brought the meeting to order.

### **Roll Call:**

### **PUBLIC COMMENTS:**

None.

### **APPROVAL OF JULY 19, 2016 MINUTES:**

After review of the minutes from July 19, 2016, a motion was made to approve the minutes by Ms. Swift and the motion was seconded by Mr. Duvall. All were in favor and the minutes were approved. The minutes from July 19, 2016 were then signed.

### **REVIEW OF CITIZEN COMMENT CARDS:**

Mr. Duvall spoke regarding the letter of commendation from CSO Todd Sales. He advised that Todd is always friendly and professional. He is a pleasure to work with.

Ms. Thornton commented on the Kudos for Records Specialist Grissom. She asked for clarification on the procedure for confirming restraining orders. She was advised by Lt. Walruff who was attending the meeting that in small agencies such as Josephine County the only way for them to confirm a restraining order would be for an officer to leave patrol, drive to the office and pull the restraining order from file then call the jail with the confirmation. In many cases smaller agencies just do not have the man power to do this. Specialist Grissom recognized the situation and worked with Josephine County and the jail to help confirm the restraining order.

Ms. Swift commented on the commendation regarding an out of control 8 year old. DC Johnson advised that working with young children is difficult as we have very few tools to help in these situations.

**INTERNAL AFFAIRS REPORT/QUARTERLY:**

Sgt. Graham reported on the third quarter of 2016. Seven (7) complaints, four (4) of those complaints were initiated by private citizens. Three (3) complaints were initiated by personnel. Of those three (3) were sustained and four (4) were unfounded.

Mr. Duvall commented that there were fewer complaints this time around. DC Johnson advised that the body worn cameras are helping reduce complaints.

Mr. Duvall questioned the resignation. DC Johnson advised that an employee has the option to resign before discipline is imposed. Due process is always conducted.

Mr. Duvall commented on the unfounded complaints. DC Johnson advised that with the body worn cameras there is now evidence to support the officer's version, but it can go the other way too and support the complaint.

Ms. Thornton asked what the process was when it was an employee versus another employee. DC Johnson advised that we interview both parties and try to determine the most likely scenario.

Lt. Walruff advised that the body worn cameras are used by all patrol. We are now going to start training the SRO's and they will then be using the cameras.

Lt. Walruff explained how the cameras are used.

Mr. Smith asked if we know when an officer is not using their camera. Lt. Walruff explained that we do check to see if everyone is using the camera and if we find that someone is not we check with the officer and find out the reason.

Ms. Thornton asked when there is an incident at one of the schools, how do officers handle the situation when kids film an encounter with their cellphones. Lt. Walruff advised that we do not stop kids from filming as it is their right to do so. The officer will instruct the students not to interfere.

**COMMENTS AND/OR WRITTEN COMMUNICATIONS BY COMMITTEE MEMBERS AND/OR STAFF:**

DC Johnson advised that today was Coffee-with-a-Cop. The event was held at Punky's Diner. It was advertised with a press release and on Facebook. DC Johnson advised that there was a good turnout and he plans on doing this 2-3 times a year. Ms. Swift advised that she stopped by and thought it went well.

Mr. Mansfield asked if we were getting used to the new building. DC Johnson advised that the move went well and well ahead of schedule. We are now adjusting to the different work flow with the new building. A couple of weeks ago there was a tour for the employees and their families. There was a very large turnout and everyone seemed to really enjoy the new building.

**Adjourn:**

There being no further business. Meeting was adjourned at 5:00 pm. The next PAC meeting will be held on Tuesday, January 17, 2017 at 4:30 pm. The meeting will be held on the first floor of the George J. Prescott Community Room #110 at the Medford Police Department, 219 S. Ivy Street.

The members were taken on a tour of the new building.



Officer Robert McCurley is currently assigned as the Domestic Violence Officer. Officer McCurley's duties include, addressing domestic violence, sexual assaults, stalking and working closely with domestic violence advocates in the community. Officer McCurley is responsible for making home visits with the victims to ensure they are safe after having experienced a violent encounter. Officer McCurley's priority is the arrest and prosecution of domestic violence offenders. Officer McCurley has not only diligently completed these tasks, but has gone above and beyond his assigned duties.

Officer McCurley attended domestic violence training in Boston, Massachusetts, and was trained in the Lethal Assessment Program. This program allows the officer to screen a victim of domestic violence during an interview and allows the officer to place the victim in contact with other agencies to receive support and resources while still on scene. This program has proven to reduce future assaults and has helped victims break the cycle of domestic violence.

Officer McCurley returned from training and worked with leaders in Clackamas County and Jackson County to implement the Lethal Assessment Program, in Jackson County. Officer McCurley worked closely with leaders in Parole and Probation and Community Works to provide a cellular phone to the Community Works Advocates, where they can be reached twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. This allows victims of domestic violence/sexual assaults to have immediate resources following a violent attack. Officer McCurley spear headed this program, training probation officers, police officers, district attorneys, domestic violence advocates, mental health case workers, judges and many other agency heads to implement this into Jackson County.

Officer McCurley's work in Jackson County has received attention from other agencies and programs in the State of Oregon. Officer McCurley has been recognized as a leader in the State of Oregon regarding Domestic Violence, Strangulation and Sexual Assaults.

In May of 2016, Officer McCurley was contacted by Louise Bauschard, who is the founder and CEO of "Voices Set Free," located in Hillsboro, Oregon. Louise Bauschard was aware of Officer McCurley's leading work for implementing the Lethal Assessment Program in Jackson County and requested him to testify in front of the joint senate/representative committee in Salem, Oregon.

On May 25, 2016, Officer McCurley testified to the Senate in Salem, Oregon, regarding the Lethal Assessment Program for Senate Bill 789. Officer McCurley demonstrated great knowledge of current Oregon Statutes and law enforcement protocol when investigating domestic violence and sexual assaults. This new bill would make it state law for all law enforcement agencies in the State of Oregon to implement the Lethal Assessment Program. It would also provide enhanced sentencing for individuals convicted of Strangulation.

Officer McCurley has also gone above and beyond his assigned duties as he is the Co-Chair for the Jackson County Council Against Domestic and Sexual Violence. This committee meets once a month and discusses issues pertaining to domestic/sexual assaults in the community. Parole/Probation, the District Attorney's Office, Public Defenders, Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA), On Track, ARC, mental health and DAAP, are all agencies who attend this meeting. Officer McCurley leads and facilitates the meeting on a monthly basis.

Officer McCurley is also the Co-Chair for the Executive Council, which includes department heads from several agencies, making a smaller committee that brings great influence into the community of Medford.

I have spoken with several of the mentioned department managers and Jackson County Circuit Court Judge Ravassipour, regarding the work Officer McCurley has accomplished. I have heard repeatedly from these individuals who work closely with Officer McCurley, that he is the glue that holds the committees and programs together. It is evident the Lethal Assessment Program would not have been accomplished if it was not for the work of Officer McCurley. Those who have worked closely with Officer McCurley recognize his humble leadership, his passion for making a difference in the community and in the lives of victims. Officer McCurley has brought unity to multiple agencies and led the way to better serve and help victims of domestic and sexual abuse. Officer McCurley's work within the last four months has not only greatly impacted the City of Medford, but has impacted the County of Jackson and the State of Oregon. Officer McCurley's leadership, influence and exceptional work should be recognized by the City of Medford.





On 10-14-16 at approximately 11:00 PM, Officers Mellgren and Read were dispatched to 1541 Hollyhock Drive Apt. "A," for a domestic disturbance. Prior to arrival, the subject had been identified as having an outstanding warrant for his arrest.

When Officers Mellgren and Read reached the front door of the residence, a female advised they better hurry because the male was attempting to flee out the back. As officers entered the residence, the male was observed heading towards the rear of the residence. Officer Read did an outstanding job of giving commands for the suspect to stop. The suspect immediately took up a fighting stance and charged at the officers. Without hesitation both Officer Mellgren and Read deployed their Tasers. The suspect continued to be hostile and completely uncooperative. Officer Mellgren again without hesitation administered controlled strikes with his ASP baton and gained compliance from the suspect, who was taken into custody.

This incident was captured on body cams of both officers. In reviewing the video from this incident these two officers need to be commended for the tactics they used and their ability to remain calm in an extremely high stress situation.
