U.S. Cellular Community Park 2015 Highlights

USCCP This Year:

- Generated an all-time record of \$11 million in estimated economic impact.
- Set records for tournament teams (1,586), visiting teams (776) and total games played (5,000).
- Attracted over 154,000 participants and spectators for league and tournament games.
- The 776 visiting teams produced over \$4.6 million in local spending.
- Experienced a 33 percent rise in youth baseball tournament team counts.
- Won the ASA national tournament hosting excellence award for all three Western Nationals.

More Fields + More Teams = More Impact Park Expansion Fuels Record-Shattering Year

The completion of the final three ballfields and a surge in tournament participation resulted in an all-time record for economic impact generated by U.S. Cellular Community Park. The 15-field sports park generated over \$11 million in estimated economic impact from 2015 tournaments and special events.

Fueled by a 21.4 percent surge in local tournament team participation and a 3.7 percent increase in teams traveling to Medford, the overall economic stimulus of the park's City-managed recreational amenities surpassed the previous high-water mark set in 2014 by over \$800,000.

More games were played at USCCP in 2015 than ever before (5,000) as a result of a whopping 33 percent growth rate in youth baseball tournaments compared to 2014 and an adult slowpitch softball league that eclipsed the 400-team mark for the first time ever.

Overall, a record-setting 1,586 tournament teams competed on the park's 14 synthetic-turf fields and Harry & David Field – a 12 percent increase.

Since opening in May 2008, USCCP has produced over \$67.7 million in economic impact, factoring in a ripple

effect. The amount of visitor spending alone since 2008 has nearly equalled the park's construction costs.

Youth Baseball Tournaments

For years, the City had to turn away teams wanting to register for youth baseball tournaments due to field-capacity limitations. The addition of

the new hardball fields, completed in early 2015 as a part of the park's fourth construction phase, allowed MPRD to run larger tournaments.

The result was a plus-68 increase in participation – from 204 teams in 2014 to 274.

All nine City-run tournaments equalled or surpassed the previous year's team counts, and seven set all-time registration records.

The popularity of the peak-season tournaments continued to carry over to the

autumn baseball series. Even though many children are focused on football and soccer in the fall, the Turkey Slam tourney on Nov. 7-8 featured a stunning 27 teams, including 12 from outside the Rogue Valley.

The advent of USCCP has influenced the popularity of baseball in the

Rogue Valley and has saved local families thousands of dollars in funds that otherwise would be necessary for out-of-town travel. In 2008, only 24 local teams registered for seven USCCP tournaments. In 2015, the same tally was 110.

Adult Slowpitch Tournaments

For the first time ever, all nine of the planned adult recreation tournaments were a “go,” producing a record for overall team counts (144) – 12 more than last year and 100 more than 2013 – the first year the City began exclusive operation of the adult tourneys.

In addition, the City received the ASA’s James Farrell award for tournament-hosting excellence for running a silky smooth, 47-team Men’s “D” and “E” Western National Tournament over Labor Day weekend. The event, which attracted teams from Idaho, Washington, Nevada, Hawaii as well as Oregon, was the largest adult softball tournament ever held in a single location in Medford history.

Fastpitch Tournaments

Participation in City-run tournaments improved 16 percent over 2014 totals, including a best-ever 24-team turnout for the Turf Wars event.

The ASA 12B Western National Tournament attracted 39 teams from Washington, Montana, Oregon and California and produced direct visitor spending of nearly \$487,000, including \$165,000 in lodging.

The three-day, 56-team Valley South College Exposure Invitational in October and the 27-team Medford Spring Break Classic combined to produce over \$1.3 million in economic value. MPRD took over coordination of the three-decade-old spring break prep scheduling service from North Medford High.

For the seventh straight year, USCCP hosted a major

ASA state tournament. In 2015, the ASA 16A state tournament drew 22 teams with all but one traveling to the Rogue Valley.



Sixty-eight more teams played in the nine youth baseball tournaments at USCCP compared to 2014 – a 33 percent increase.

Memorial Day Weekend


Medford’s 2,600 hotel rooms were jam-packed Memorial Day weekend as a result of two simultaneous sporting events: the City of Medford’s 51-team youth baseball tournament and the 165-team Rogue Valley Timbers Memorial Challenge soccer tournament.

The 116 visiting teams that competed at USCCP spent over \$210,000 in hotel lodging. Overall, the events funneled over \$1.5 million into the local economy.

Adult Sports Leagues

Over 2,500 city-league softball, soccer, kickball and men’s baseball games were played at USCCP in 2015, a scheduling load unfathomable on natural-grass fields.

For the first time ever, MPRD surpassed the 400-

team plateau over the course of a calendar year. This year, 418 teams registered in at least one of four seasons of play: winter (39), spring (91), summer (156) and fall (132).

Contract User Groups

USCCP is the home field for seven varsity teams from Cascade Christian High and St. Mary’s School. North Medford and Phoenix High

also utilized the multi-sport complex.

The Rogue Valley Timbers youth soccer program played 166 state competitive league games at the USCCP multi-sport complex during the spring and fall, which produced over \$977,000 in economic impact.

About U.S. Cellular Community Park

U.S. Cellular Community Park (USCCP) is owned and operated by the City of Medford. USCCP is the largest municipal installation of FieldTurf in the United States with nearly 1.5 million square-feet of synthetic grass.

- U.S. Cellular paid \$650,000 for park naming-rights in 2005. At the time it was the largest naming-rights agreement for a municipal recreational facility in Oregon history.

- The 5-field softball/baseball complex opened on May 9, 2008 and has already hosted 31,500 youth and adult games.



Significance of the Economic Impact Report

In most communities, parks and recreation agencies are the engines of tourism and economic development. Recreational facilities like USCCP attract tourists, businesses and retirees, and enhance real estate values. A common mistake for parks and agencies is to merely provide decision-makers with financial reports on the revenue and expenses of these facilities instead of illustrating economic impact and the broader value of the community's investment. Economic impact reports are estimates and are easily inflated.

Methodology and Data Collection

This study closely follows the economic impact data-collection and calculation methods set forth by Texas A&M researcher Dr. John L. Crompton in his landmark 1999 book, Measuring the Economic Impact.

Crompton contends only spending by visitors to Medford is meaningful in economic impact reports. Expenditures by tournament participants who reside in or near Medford are not included in Personal Income and Jobs calculations because of the likelihood their money would have been spent in the community on other forms of entertainment. The economic impact report also does not calculate the impact of participants in City-sponsored sports leagues that utilize USCCP.

The questionnaire used for this study generated spending data from tournament directors regarding approximate amounts each team spent on entry fees, food and beverages, entertainment, retail shopping, transportation expenses and lodging.

Conclusions

Total Spending: USCCP hosted 45 tournaments or events that attracted 1,586 teams that spent an estimated \$5,982,350 in hard dollars.

Visitor Spending: The 810 visiting teams spent nearly \$4.7 million. Visitor lodging accounted for 25 percent of the expenditures. Softball team size is estimated at 14; baseball, fastpitch teams and soccer is estimated at 18.

Sales: Total Spending by all USCCP tournament participants (local and visiting teams) multiplied by a "ripple effect" of 85 cents for every dollar spent, for a grand total of \$11,067,348. The 1.85 multiplier is based on Crompton studies of tournaments in a city of similar size.

Personal Income: This measure reports the direct, indirect and induced spending of visiting teams only. For every dollar spent by tournament visitors, 65 cents of personal income accrued within the community in the form of employee wages, salaries and proprietary income. Simply stated, USCCP theoretically generated \$39 for each Medford resident.

Jobs: If one job is created for every \$44,918 – Medford's median income – USCCP tournaments helped sustain nearly 104 jobs in the community based on the direct spending of visiting teams. The figure refers to both full- and part-time jobs, and it assumes the local economy is operating at full capacity and that there is no slack to absorb demand created by USCCP events.
